It may seem intimidating, but start completely with what you have. Don't try to fake it. I promise your Spanish will get better.

One of the things that I did that helped me prepare for the AP test was getting used to reading Spanish outside of class. I recommend downloading an app like BBC Mundo and reading a bit about Spanish countries every morning.
